

Jesus Shows Humility!

Key Verse:
“Humble yourselves, therefore, under God’s mighty hand, that He may lift you up in due time.”

1 Peter 5:6

Level 4 lesson 22

Extra: In what ways could you be more humble?

Read Mark 9:33-35 and Luke 9:46-48

One day when the Lord Jesus was with His disciples in a house in Capernaum, they were arguing among themselves. On the way to the city Jesus had noticed they were unhappy, and now they told Him what had been the problem. They were trying to decide which of them would be the greatest!

Hey, isn’t that like many men and women, and boys and girls today? They always want to be first, and have other people notice them. They always think they can do things far better than anyone else; they think they are smarter than others; their job is better, even the things they own are simply the best. They have no time for other people, who are not so important! Their only concern is themselves. They want to be famous, important, and “get ahead” in life.

Do you know what Jesus said about this? He said, “He that is least among you shall be great.” That means it isn’t the smartest person, or the most important, or the one who boasts the most that is the greatest. Instead, it’s the person who is humble, gracious, and thoughtful of others. “Let him who wants to be the greatest be the servant of all,” Jesus continued.

Wow! That’s pretty radical talk isn’t it? You won’t hear that sort of talk too often. But if we want to be great in the eyes of the Lord Jesus Christ, we must be willing to put ourselves in the background and let others go first. We must encourage, help, and serve others - even our enemies!

You know, it’s so easy to think of ourselves first and what we want. Have you ever made good resolutions at New Year, or on your birthday? Perhaps you decided never to be mean or disobedient or want your own way ever again.



How long did it take before that good intention was forgotten? Not long, if we’re honest! That’s why we need the Lord Jesus Christ in our hearts to help us and give us strength to do what’s right.

The Lord Jesus can help us to be humble and gracious. If we love Him, then we need to ask Him day by day to help us forget ourselves and help others in their need. That doesn’t mean that we should not want to do our best at school, at play, and at home, for we should always try to do well. It does mean though, that we should not boast about it, but encourage and help others as well.

We will also want others to discover real joy with God. Each letter of the word **JOY** can be used to remind us of a good rule for living: **J**esus first, **O**thers second, **Y**ourself last! That’s the right order to put ourselves in, if we want to have **true joy** in life.

Remember Jesus Christ Himself is our example. He washed the disciple’s dirty, dusty feet when no one else was willing to do it, even though He was by far the greatest, most important person to ever walk the earth! That’s what He meant when He said, “He that is greatest among you shall be your servant.”

Jesus Heals Blindness!



Key Verse:
“The Lord is near to all who call on Him in truth.”

Psalm 145:18

Level 4 lesson 23

Extra: Comment on those who witnessed this miracle but still did not believe Jesus.

Read Mark 10:46-52 and Luke 18:35-43

Blind people are often very clever in the way they get around and do so many things. Of course, there are times when they are glad of some help too! Whenever you see a blind person, always be ready to help them in whatever way you can. The Lord Jesus always helped and often HEALED the blind people He met. In Bible days, blind people were not well cared for. Many of them were regarded as outcasts; they were neglected and forced to sit by the roadside and beg.

Our reading today, concerns a poor blind man named Bartimaeus, which simply means “Son of Timaeus.” He lived in Jericho and grew up without any education, and was unable to work because of his blindness. Every day, he would sit by the roadside and beg for a living. His favourite spot was near the gate of the city, where there were always people coming and going.

One day as he sat begging, he heard the sound of a big crowd of people coming along the road. He asked what was going on and found out that Jesus was coming! Excitedly, he thought to himself, “Jesus, the great Healer is coming this way. This is my chance to get my sight!” As the crowd came nearer, he called out loudly, “Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!”

Some people standing close by said, “Keep quiet! Stop yelling! This is the great Teacher and you are just a blind beggar. He won’t have time for you!” But Bartimaeus ignored them and called out again even louder! Suddenly, everything went quiet. The crowd had stopped. Someone touched Bartimaeus and said, “Jesus heard you calling. Come on, He’s calling for you!” His heart pounding, Bartimaeus sprang up, threw off his dirty coat, and guided by one of the people, he hurried to Jesus.

Then he heard Jesus’ kind voice ask, “What do you want Me to do for you?” “Oh Master,” Bartimaeus replied, “that I might receive my sight!” Knowing his faith, Jesus replied, “Go, your faith has healed you.” Immediately Bartimaeus could see! How amazing! He was so happy his heart was nearly bursting! What a change this would mean for him. He would not be a beggar any more. He was so grateful to Jesus.

Now, what was Bartimaeus to do? Go home and forget all about Jesus? Go away and selfishly enjoy the blessing he had received? No! He FOLLOWED JESUS. He wanted to serve Jesus, the one who had given him his sight. How gracious the Lord Jesus is! Always ready to help and listening for the faintest call. He’s never too tired or busy to help and bless whenever He finds a heart to trust Him.

Now, we know that this man was blind physically, but there is a ‘blindness’ which we can have in our hearts and minds which is far worse! Yes friends, it is possible to see with our eyes, and yet be blind in our hearts because of our selfishness and sin. Many in the crowd that day who saw Bartimaeus receive his sight, still did not believe in Jesus!

Sin ‘blinds’ us so that we cannot ‘see’ God, and we refuse His love and willingness to forgive sin. The Bible says the ‘pure in heart shall see God,’ and only the Lord Jesus can make our lives pure. Ask Him to open your spiritual eyes today, so that you might know His love and grace, and realise that He alone can take away your selfishness and sin!
