

Read Genesis 37:12-36

They grabbed him roughly, tore off his lovely many-coloured coat and threw him in a dry well. Then they sat down to have something to eat.

While they were having lunch, some traders came along on camels. Reuben (the eldest brother) who had tried to protect Joseph, was looking after the sheep when the traders came. While he was away, the other brothers sold Joseph as a slave, for twenty silver coins. What a wicked thing to do to poor Joseph!

Reuben was very upset to find out what his brothers had done. “What are we going to do now?” he cried. “What will we tell our father?” As always, one sin leads to another and the brothers decided to lie to their father. They took Joseph’s coat, tore it and put some blood on it.



They wanted their father to think that Joseph had been attacked and killed by a wild animal. When they got home, they told him they had found the coat along the way.

Jacob recognised it straight away. “It’s Joseph’s!” he cried. “A wild animal has killed him!” Jacob was very sad and cried. Joseph’s brothers felt terrible, too.




Level 2 lesson 35

Read Genesis 41:1-44

Joseph was in prison for more than two years. Then one night, Pharaoh the King had a very strange dream. The next night he had another one. They were so clear, yet he didn't know what they meant. He asked all his wise men but no-one could tell him what the dreams meant. Pharaoh got very angry.

Finally, the butler remembered Joseph in prison and told Pharaoh all about him. Pharaoh brought Joseph from the prison and told him what he had seen. In one dream he saw seven lean, thin cows that swallowed up seven fat ones. In the other dream he saw seven big fat stalks of corn eaten up by seven thin, weak stalks of corn (Read about it in Genesis 41:1-8).

Then Pharaoh said, "I have heard you can explain dreams; what do these dreams mean?" Joseph explained to Pharaoh that it was God who helped him understand dreams. He then told Pharaoh what the dreams meant.


Level 2 lesson 36

Read Genesis 42:1-34

Pharaoh’s dreams came true, just as Joseph had said. There were seven years of plenty and then the famine began. Even back in Israel, Joseph’s father Jacob and his brothers had no food. One day Jacob told his sons, “We can’t sit here dying of hunger. They have food in Egypt; go down there and buy some.” So he sent ten of his sons off to buy food in Egypt, but kept Benjamin, the youngest, at home with him.

In Egypt, Joseph was in charge of all the food. People were coming to him to buy it. One day he recognised his own brothers standing in line! They didn’t recognise him though. They thought he was an Egyptian ruler and bowed down in front of him. So Joseph spoke roughly to them. “Who are you?” he asked, “and where are you from? You must be spies!” He wanted to see what they would say and if they had changed over the years.

Joseph’s brothers were scared. “We’re not spies,” they replied, “We just need to buy food!”




They told Joseph they were sons of Jacob and their youngest brother, Benjamin, was still at home. Oh how Joseph wanted to see him!
